### FRIDAY, JUNE 12 - RIVERSIDE PARK, DOWNTOWN LA CROSSE

7 pm "Lost & Found" concert, which was open-to-the-public and all synod-wide congregational members, took place at the band shell in Riverside Park along the Mississippi River. A free will offering was collected to offset the cost of the concert.

Bishop Arends introduced the presenter for the first Assembly Mission Story:

**Bob Weeks**, **World Hunger Sub-committee** shared the story of providing crop seeds for farmers in Nicaragua.

**Bishop Arends led the recognition of pastors and congregations with anniversaries.** (Assembly Book, pages 16-17). Rev. Vern Skarstad was added to the 50-year anniversary list, and certificates were handed out to pastors and/or voting congregational members present.

# BISHOP Arends welcomed Stephen McDougal, professor of Political Science at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse, to serve as Synod Assembly parliamentarian.

Mr. McDougal conducted an orientation of Voting Members reviewing Robert's Rules of order (Green Assembly Book, page 4) along with discussion of motions, resolutions and voting.

#### Assembly General Announcements – Vice-President Lori Toso:

Our Synod is comprised of 74 congregations and our Synod is one of 65 Synods of the ELCA. Voting members were asked to prayerfully discern all matters brought before the Assembly.

- Reviewed list of Sunday morning workshops and urged discussion with other voting members from your congregation so, as a group, you can see as many different presentations as possible.

- Reviewed the focus and intention of display tables, all located in plenary room
- Welcomed attendees to feel free to take pictures during assembly and then forward them to Melanie or Pr. Libby at the synod office (<u>office@lacrosseareasynod.org</u>) or <u>assistant@lacrosseareasynod.org</u>)
- Vice President Toso called attention to the yellow handout seeking leaders for synod committees (Handout #1). She encouraged voting members to bring this sheet back to congregations and help find people interested in serving on Synod-wide Committees. (See attachment at end of this document.)

#### BISHOP Arends introduced the presenters for the next two Assembly Mission Stories:

**Jean Pagliaro** described the upcoming **National ELCA Youth Gathering** that occurs every 3 years and will take place from July 15-19 in Detroit with over 30,000 youth. Our Synod will be sending 266 youth from 18 congregations along with pastors and adults.

**Bill Newburg**, from the **Synod Endowment Fund Board**, shared the overall goal of the Fund to provide for future ministries and the building up of the Synod Seminarian Fund to provide for partial scholarships. The Fund has grown from \$10,000 in 2010 to \$70,000 in 2015, with an additional new bequest of \$100,000. The last 3 years the Fund has granted \$7,000 worth of scholarships each year, and hopes to increase this amount in the future. It is anticipated that the ELCA will need up to 4,000 new pastors in the next 10 years.

#### Bishop Arends reviewed the BISHOP'S STATISTICAL REPORT

(pgs. 16-17 in Green Assembly Book and attached at end of this document)

#### Bishop Arends introduced the presenters for the next two Mission Stories:

**Kathleen Sumrall, W-ELCA**, described the activities of the **synod Women of the ELCA** and its annual meeting.

**Cindy Berg**, **Mission Interpreters**, described the scope of the Synod's Mission Interpreter program and the support it provides to congregations in training mission interpreters to tell the stories of the larger church.

Bishop Arends announced that any business not completed this afternoon will be directed for future consideration and action to the Synod Council.

Bishop Arends asked voting members to consider ideas of where to designate the offering to go from our sending service, Sunday morning.

Bishop Arends introduced Derek Jackson, Synod Treasurer. Derek first reviewed the Synod's

Treasurer's report for all budget categories as of January 31, 2015. (Handout #2 – Green - Synod Treasurer's Report) Derek noted that we have been drawing from our Synod Reserve Fund the past several years to meet budgeted shortfalls and that this amount could go down. He also noted the amount in the Replacement Reserve Fund. (see Treasurer's Report on synod web page, <a href="www.lacrosseareasynod.org">www.lacrosseareasynod.org</a>, for 2015 Synod Assembly)

Derek then led the second reading of the proposed 2016 Budget (Handout #3 Blue Proposed 2016

Mission Support Budget). The proposed budget contains an overall 3% salary increase for staff and \$1,000 increase for the Bishop. Costs for personnel insurance are up \$7,000. Costs are up for auto maintenance and insurance, office insurance and building maintenance. There is a new line item 4B.6 for Sabbaticals for Bishop and Asst. to the Bishop of \$1,000 to add to the \$3,000 approved in 2015. Costs for postage are reduced by \$200 and all other categories remain at the same funding as 2015. The proposed 2016 budget continues ELCA first 55% of Mission Support, and based on using the same projected revenue estimate as 2015 will result in the need to potentially borrow over \$10,000 from the Synod Reserve Fund. **Terry Lee, Mission Support**, described plans for assisting congregations in increasing overall Mission Support to meet the future needs of our Synod.

BISHOP Arends introduced Rev. Dr. Stephen Bouman, Executive Director, ELCA Congregational & Synodical Mission, for the Report of the ELCA. Rev. Bouman shared information regarding the rapid changes in our church, the need for leaders, and the many ministries the larger ELCA is involved in.

#### What is the La Crosse Area Synod about?

We are continually accepting the call to Walk the Word (the Living Word of God, Jesus the Christ).

Almost all of our 74 congregations:

- Proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ each week in public worship.
- Provide opportunities for youth to grow in faith each week.
- Encourage youth
  - o as campers at Sugar Creek and Luther Park Bible Camps,
  - o in youth servant trips, and
  - o in the ELCA's National Youth Gatherings.

Two of our congregations have had members serving as ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission.

Many of our congregations have trained leaders in the synod sponsored Great Practices Series (GPS).

Most of our congregations hold Bible studies for adults monthly and/or weekly.

Five of our congregations have helped to train intern pastors this year.

Some of our congregations

- House food shelves and clothes closets to help our neighbors in need,
- Host monthly or weekly free meals for the hungry, the lonely, and those who like to socialize.

While many members of our congregations help at or provide for these ministries.

The La Crosse Area Synod's presence in service has increased at the La Crosse Warming Shelter.

Many ELCA folk are volunteering with ethnic specific ministries.

Many of our congregations sponsor

- Missionaries and
- Lutheran Campus Ministry of La Crosse.

Almost all of our congregations take special offerings for

- the ELCA's World Hunger Appeal.
- for Lutheran Disaster Response as special needs arise.

And ALL of our congregations participated in the Malaria Campaign.

And the list goes on.

This is what the La Crosse Area Synod is about. This is our synod at work – as individuals, as congregations, as clusters of congregations working together, and in synod-wide projects. We are living out the most basic of mission statements, straight from Jesus the Christ in the Gospel of Matthew:

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." And ..."You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you.

And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.

#### **Portable Love**

I am thankful for all that we do. I am thankful for all who volunteer. I am thankful for all who pray. And I am thankful for all who give. The farther we serve beyond our congregations, the more we serve through financial gifts — **our money becomes our portable love** reaching farther than most of us can travel. Coming together as Synod enables us to share God's Word and love farther than any one household or any one congregation can go alone. Thank you for the distance your love travels.

I especially appreciate two of our Synod's accomplishments over the last year. First, to repeat, ALL 74 of our congregations joined in the Malaria Campaign, taking us beyond our three-year goal of \$150,000 to over \$167,000! Thank you.

Second, you responded beyond my dreams to the challenge I put before you at last year's assembly. As we are in the process of reshaping Lutheran Campus Ministry in La Crosse, I asked you to provide an additional \$30,000 in gifts to LCM-L for each of the next three years. You are doing it! Thank you.

Today, in a way we are voting on three special appeals: (1) World Hunger, (2) Always Being Made New: the Campaign for the ELCA, and (3) a goal to surpass our budget. Each of these challenges us to go far beyond where we have gone.

From 2013 to 2014 our Synod lifted our per baptized giving to the Hunger Appeal to \$3.50. This raised us from 64<sup>th</sup> among the 65 synods of the ELCA to 46<sup>th</sup>. Last year our Assembly adopted the Hunger Subcommittee's goal of increasing to \$4.00 per baptized member within the past year. This year we are asked to challenge ourselves to give \$150,000 in 2016 (\$4.30 per baptized member). Gifts to the ELCA Hunger Appeal will fight hunger in this country and throughout the world through assistance, instruction and advocacy. We can do this.

In 2014 this assembly named the La Crosse Area Synod as participants in "Always Being Made New: the Campaign for the ELCA." The campaign aims to increase our church's efforts and effectiveness in a number of areas:

- Starting and renewing congregations,
- Ministries with those with disabilities,
- Raising up leaders,
- Working with youth,
- Fighting hunger and malaria, and
- Serving the global church through
  - Missionary sponsorship.
  - Young Adults in Global Mission, and
  - Support for women leaders in our partner churches.

The Synod Council appointed a task force to suggest a goal for the five year Campaign that ends January 31, 2019. The Task Force discovered that present giving rates to the Hunger Appeal plus the gifts already given to the Malaria Campaign assume at least \$775,000 counting toward the Campaign - without any additional effort. So the Task Force is asking

this Assembly to challenge our synod to raise a total of \$1.1 million. Yes, that is \$1,100,000. But it is just \$335,000 beyond what is presently expected. We can do this.

Finally, we will be voting to accept our budget. The proposed budget assumes increased giving to Mission Support (the monies congregations put to use through the synod's general fund enabling the Synod and the ELCA to reach out into the world with God's Word and love). And the budget assumes the need to borrow over \$10,000 from our Synod's Reserve Fund. This, in the long run, is a losing practice. But the Synod's Mission Support Committee is inviting us to challenge ourselves to increase our congregations' giving to Mission Support by \$100,000 over last year. They have a plan to accomplish this. We can do this.

In these three special appeals we are invited to put our money where our ministry is. We are being asked to put our portable love where our ministry is. We are being challenged to Walk the Word in action and in giving. We can do this.

#### With Gratitude

We will spend much of this assembly celebrating the ministry we do together and exploring ways to more deeply affect God's world for the future. As we do this I must say thank you. Thank you for all you do to serve Jesus in your daily lives, in your congregations, and through this synod. Thank you to all who have accepted the invitation to serve on the Synod Council, on Synod committees, subcommittees, task forces and special projects. You are appreciated. It is because of you led by the Holy Spirit, that we can do this.

Special thanks are always due the Synod Staff: DEM & Assistant to the Bishop Libby Howe, Executive Administrator Melanie Timmerman, Receptionist and Mobility Specialist Deb Wold, and Bookkeeper Alice DaFoe. And most special thanks to my wife Lynn who supports me in keeping this crazy schedule while keeping me mindful of the needs for self-care and grandkid time.
