





Music-Thanatology in Care for the Dying

Music-thanatology is a palliative medical modality and end-of-life practice of caring for the physical and spiritual needs of the dying with prescriptive music. The music delivered responds to both the physiological pain and interior suffering of those who are dying, and is delivered live, at the bedside, with harp and voice. Ruth is a student at the Chalice of Repose Project School of Music-Thanatology based in Mt. Angel, OR. Ruth is a music-thanatology clinical intern and her field placement has been developed between the school and the La Crosse Area Synod.
